- a. encouraging national and local governments to organise gratnts, funedd by the World Bank, with special focus on LEDCs, technical assistance, and mentorship programs for youth-led projects focused on carbon neutrality, reforestation, and sustainable urban planning b. promoting community-based carbon offset programs where young people lead afforestation, renewable energy, and waste reduction projects, with incentives such as tax benefits or recognition programs

- c. creating an international youth climate innovation fund to support scalable youth-led initiatives that aim to reduce carbon footprints in urban and rural communities
- d. establishing collaborative platforms for knowledge exchange between youth, environmental experts, and policymakers to ensure effective implementation and expansion of youth-driven sustainability projects.
